Ms. Rosenthal covers the gamut of issues likely to be encountered, such as corporate law, contracts, compensation of management, mission statements, copyrights, licensing, boards of directors, minutes of meetings, fundraising, trademark law and even government lobbying. While it is written for lawyers and students (there are focus

questions and work plans at the end of most chapters), this book can be read by just about anyone who is involved or may wish to be involved in such organizations.
