By Steven R. McEvoy I must admit I have been a huge fan of Noah benShea's writing since encountering the book *Jacob the Baker* at a retreat at a street mission in Toronto many year ago. This book is very different than the *Jacob* series, and yet like everything I have read by Noah is full of wisdom, wisdom that will help you live a better life and be a better person. The difference is as a formal teacher and principal and someone with a lifelong focus on education this book is geared to teachers. In my life I have been blessed with a few amazing teachers, many good teachers and luckily very few who were poor educators. As I read through this book I took inspiration and recalled fondly many teachers from my past, from grade school all the way to university in my late 30's. I also thought of a few friends who are currently teachers and the great work they do. The collection of quotes in this book are narrowed down to 26 categories.
