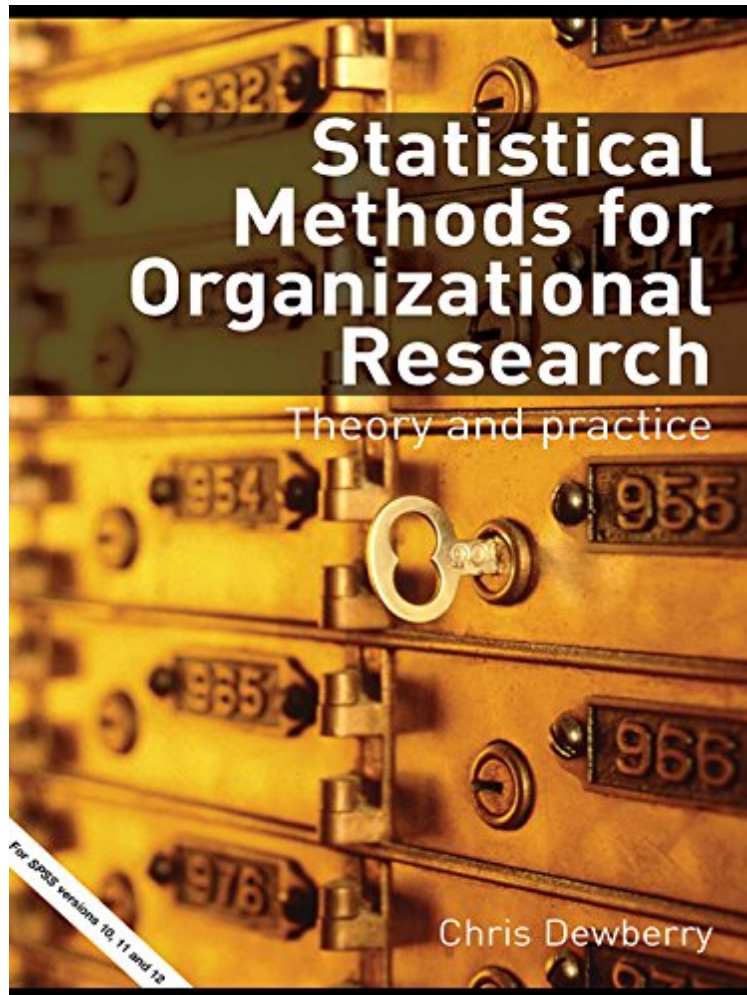


Statistical Methods for Organizational Research: Theory and Practice
